Alicia Michael is the former owner of an automotive collision repair company in Georgia, USA. After serving as the managing director of her company for two years, she became a partner in 2000. She went on to become the sole owner and CEO in 2002 and remained until the sale of her business in January 2016.



After spending several years focusing on her business, Alicia began looking for a way to serve her community and was introduced to Rotary. She joined the Rotary Club of Carrollton Dawnbreakers in March 2005. Alicia was honored to receive the District 6900 Sheffield Leadership Award in 2008-2009 for District President of the Year in Category II club size.

She is a member of the Paul Harris Fellow Society and The Rotary Foundation Bequest Society. Alicia served District 6900 as an Assistant Governor from 2010-2013 and as the Rotary District 6900 Governor in 2014 – 2015, working with 69 Rotary clubs and over 4,300 Rotarians throughout the state of Georgia.

Other non-profit and community involvement includes service on the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, the Carroll County Women's Business Alliance Board of Directors in and Executive Director of Carroll County's Certified Literate Community Program, LIFT

(Literacy Is for Today and Tomorrow, Inc.) from 2012 to 2015. She also served on the Advisory Board for the 2014 100 Black Men of Atlanta Football Classic and on the Board of Directors for the Atlanta Tipoff Club (presenter of the NCAA Basketball Naismith Trophy). Alicia was named the Chamber of Commerce Small Business Person of the Year in 2010 and the Women's Business Alliance Woman of the Year in 2014 in her community.

Alicia assumed the role of President with Rotarians for Family Health and AIDS Prevention, Inc. in January 2016. She is now focused on the business of making a difference by creating and maintaining sustainable partnerships through global outreach and messaging.

MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT



Looking back at the momentous 1917 Rotary Convention in Atlanta, it is difficult to see what could have been contentious about the words of then-President Arch C. Klumph: “It seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world.” Yet, at the time, support for the idea was far from unanimous. Some thought an endowment fund would create more trouble than it was worth. But Klumph’s idea received the support it most needed in the form of an initial donation of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Mo.

Nearly 100 years later, we recognize Klumph’s idea as not only visionary, but revolutionary: It set in place the mechanism that allowed Rotary to become the vast force for “doing good in the world” that it is today.

In many ways, our Rotary Foundation is the foundation of Rotary as we know it. It has created a mechanism for cooperation and partnership among clubs and between Rotary and other organizations; it has enabled us to be ever more ambitious in our work and to reach for goals of historic proportions, such as the eradication of

polio. It is impossible to quantify the good that has been done over the last century as a result of The Rotary Foundation. All we can know for sure is that Arch Klumph, if he could see it, would be proud.

I am looking forward to seeing you at our international convention in Atlanta: the city where our Foundation was born. I hope a record number of Rotarians will be there to celebrate the centennial of our Foundation.
